- a document involve research and planning to form the argument and structure of the article.
- 24 Allow yourself sufficient time to discover and think through a topic. As with any skill, writing
- 25 skills are developed with practice and feedback from your audience. Your argument must be
- presented in a format and style that is appropriate for the audience. This document is prepared in
- 27 the style and format for a submission to the Journal of Wildlife Management (Chamberlain and
- Johnson 2008). Constructive criticism from your readers is essential to understanding your topic
- and to improving your ability to write clearly.
- 30 GAME is a pneumonic guide to the elements of preparing a professional communication
- 31 (Jacobson 2005). Ask yourself the following questions as you plan your assignment:
- Goal: what do you want to achieve with this product?
 - Audience: what group do you want to influence?
- Message: what are the message and the style of presentation?
- Evaluation: how will you know that you have reached your audience and achieved your
